
Station 5:

Create your own Rorschach Inkblot. Follow directions on the worksheet at the table.

1. Put your name and class period on the back of a blank sheet of paper.
2. Prepare your workspace. If you're clumsy like you'll want to cover your surface (and possibly underneath!). Use some extra paper. You will hold a regular sheet of computer paper in half and then unfold it.




3. On an unfolded sheet, delicately squeeze paint on one half (it can be black or multi colored). Be mindful of how large of an area you add paint, as this will spread out when you transfer it to the watercolor paper. Keep the paint random as you don't want the inkblot to look planned- this is part of its appeal! Keep it from the edges and remember A LITTLE GOES A LONG WAY!!!!



4. Fold over the blank side of the paper to meet the painted side. Using both hands, smooth the paper. Your paint will spread, so be careful you don't push it to the edges.



5. Unfold the paper.



6. Let your inkblot dry.



8. Find a place around the room and tape up your final product to the wall. You will need to use several different pieces of tape to make sure it stays up.
